Support at home when you need it

Ōmārama-based Sonya Trusler has been appointed as a Royal District Nursing Service support worker for the Ahuriri and upper Waitaki area.

And the organisation, which operates throughout Otago, is looking for more support workers to meet the emerging need.

Sonya has been in the role for just over a month, although working in the care sector is not something that is new to her.

She also works for Healthcare NZ, and prior to moving to Ōmārama worked for McGlynn homes in Oamaru, in all gaining seven years' experience in the aged care and disabilities sectors. "I really enjoy it."

She said she was particularly excited about this opportunity because the RDNS emphasis was very much on caring for people of all age groups in their own homes. And she wants to encourage others to put their hands up for the job.

The important point to know was that you did not have to be a nurse to apply, Sonya said.

"You have to have compassion and enjoy helping people. You are trained to do the job you do."

The work can be as varied as helping people shower or with dressings or helping with housework. No two posts were the same. If a doctor or the hospital sees a need, they will refer the person to the service for support.

"The more support workers we get, the more clients we can take on," Sonya said. It is not just elderly care. Support is provided for all ages.

It can be for those who need extra help after surgery, or help with physio, or for people or families that need an extra hand, she said.

Every case and every need was different and RDNS work to meet those needs with the ultimate goal of helping people to have independence in their home.

"We're not there to do everything for clients but to support them."

Ōmārama had an aging population and the need for this service had been recognised, even although the community was well-used to looking out for each other, she said. "Being a small community we all know our neighbours and know when something is different and people need help."

Sonya is also an Ōmārama Fire Brigade First Response and operational support volunteer.

Once the referral is made to RDNS the first likely point of contact in this area is clinical nurse manager Rebecca McCrorie, a registered nurse

Rebecca covers the Waitaki Valley, Oamaru, and as far south as North Dunedin, and "everyone in between", which includes a lot of the "little small towns", Rebecca said. Her role is to receive the referrals and then meet with clients to assess their needs. Clients are referred from the ACC, Te Whatu Ora – Health New Zealand, the Ministry of Health, and can include those with long term chronic needs.

The role is "very client-based", Rebecca said.

Although referrals generally come from doctors or the hospital, people who need extra support can make *direct contact* and they would be directed to the right place, Rebecca said. Rebecca said the agency "would love" more support workers and the need was especially great in the Kurow area.

The focus in healthcare now is to help people "age well at home", and so we are doing our best to support that, Rebecca said.

ABOUT RDNS NEW ZEALAND - HOME HELP SPECIALISTS

The Royal District Nursing Service is a not-for-profit organisation which provides a range of home nursing and home support services to people of all ages and cultures in the comfort and security of their own homes.

It services clients throughout Southland, Otago and Auckland districts with offices located in Invercargill, Alexandra, Dunedin and Auckland.

The range of Government-funded and private services includes: domestic assistance, personal care, respite care, restorative support and social support. RDNS accepts referrals from a range of health and home support professionals, including general practitioners, hospitals and other healthcare and support workers. Once referred a tailored service plan is developed with the client to meet individual needs.

The RDNS has a 'Restorative Model of Care' designed to encourage the client to have a say in their support services and to have an active role in deciding how the organisation can best provide care and support to them.

Positive signs of progress with review

After a long wait – progress has been described as 'glacial' – parties appear to be making headway in coming to a new understanding about when the Ōmārama Fire First Response should be turned out to medical emergencies.

As well, Hato Hone St John has given an assurance more Ōmārama volunteers will be trained as first responders before the end of the year.

The Ōmārama First Response unit wants to be sent to all medical 111 emergency calls regardless of how serious they are because the nearest St John Ambulance and other medical assistance is at least 30km or 20 minutes away.

However, it has battled since August 2021 to have this response model formally recognised by St John and Fire and Emergency New Zealand in their interagency Memorandum of Understanding which governs the day-to-day relationship.

A public meeting was held in August 2022, which more than 200 attended, and the community made it clear to both agencies it wanted the Ōmārama First Response to be called to all medical emergencies regardless of acuity.

St John and Fenz promised to consider this 'local agreement' in their review of the MOU which started in November last year.

And until the review they would send the Ōmārama First Response to medical calls as per its 'enhanced trial' of the model – that is, it would be turned out to all medical calls not just life-threatening calls.

While it is not yet 'signed, sealed and delivered', this week the Ōmārama Gazette received a positive response to questions put to the parties about progress. Fenz acting national manager, response capability, Aaron Waterreus said, while recent weather events had caused some delays, - continued over

"stakeholders and interested parties" have had the opportunity to give feedback to the MOU review and they were "back on track now".

"This feedback is currently being worked through in a series of meetings between Hato Hone St John and Fire and Emergency.

"We hope to be at a point to have a draft document out to our key stakeholders for review and comments in May," Mr Waterreus said.

The MOU also lays out the training specifications for first responders.

In the past few months more people have volunteered to train as first responders for the Ōmārama Brigade. They do not want to be firefighters.

The Ōmārama and Districts Community Co-Response Trust has offered to arrange this and find the funds, if necessary.

Some long-time first response volunteers are hoping to step back and new recruits are needed. Plus, there is a high ratio of medical calls to fire calls in this area. Mr Waterreus said despite the legal status of the MOU being "due for review" there was no expiry date and so it continued to "work as it should".

"Issues such as courses for medical first responder training have recently been worked through with Hato Hone St John, and a number of courses have been scheduled, with several more about to be announced," he said.

In a separate email St John spokeswoman Amy Milne said first responder training was "set for later this year".

"We're expecting to finalise the dates by the end of this week. Once we have, Fire and Emergency NZ will then communicate those dates with the Ōmārama Brigade," she said.

So far this year, from July 2022 to March 2023, the Ōmārama Volunteer Fire Brigade has attended a total of 104 calls.

Of these, 48 were to a medical emergency and 46 were to a fire call.

There were also 10 motor vehicle accidents to which both Fire and First Response crews are turned out.

The First Response teams were on scene at those medical emergencies for anywhere from 30 minutes to two-and-a-half hours. The average time spent on scene is one-and-a-half hours.

Last year for the full year – July 2021 to June June 2022 - Brigade volunteers went to a total of 95 calls.

Last month, the Ōmārama And Districts Community Co-Response Trust chairman Lindsay Purvis and Fenz Ōmārama chief Fire Officer Greg Harper sent a letter to Fenz chief executive Kerry Gregory expressing frustration at the length of time taken to review the MOU and asking him to intervene and make the required changes. His office has acknowledged receipt of the email and promised a reply once they have had time to look into the matter.

At the same time a petition with 796 signatures which asks the House of Representatives to urge Fenz and St John to make the required changes has been handed to Waitaki MP Jacqui Dean to present to Parliament.

The Trust has been told prominent rural agencies such as the Hauora Taiwhenua Rural Health Network (formerly the New Zealand Rural General Practice Network), Rural Women New Zealand and the Rural Support Trust are prepared to submit in support of the petition.

Anzac Day service returns to Hall

Anzac Day services this year will return to the Omarama Memorial Hall.

For the past 12 years the service has been held at the Memorial Rock which was installed outside the Omarama Police Station in 2010 as a site for an outdoor gathering in the centre of town.

Last year, with the permission of the Upper Waitaki Returned and Services Association the eight tonne Rock with its commemorative plaques and the flagpole were moved and now rest at the front of the Hall and Community Centre.

The move was made because of concerns about safety because large numbers were gathering close to the main road, and because of traffic noise.

It also means the Hall can be used for the service in inclement weather. The last Anzac Day service at the Hall was in the 1970s.

This year's service will be at the usual time of 11am on Anzac day and will be followed by refreshments at the Hall.

ICYMI Hotel ownership changes hands

Growing optimism in the tourism sector with the return of international visitors is behind the Distinction Group's recent purchase of Ōmārama's Heritage Gateway and Countrytime hotels, owner Geoff Thomson says.

Last month, commercial real estate firm JLL announced the Ōmārama hotels plus the Mackenzie Country Hotel, Twizel, had been bought by the Distinction Group from the Mt Cook Hotel Collection.

Mr Thomson said the return of international visitors and a "growing influence on activity up and down the country" was key to the decision to add "three well-positioned assets" to its South Island portfolio.

The Distinction Group will begin operating in Ōmārama on August 1.

The company owns 16 hotels in the North and South islands including in Fox Glacier and Wanaka, and the Luxmore Hotel and Te Anau Hotel and Villas, in Te Anau

Mount Cook Hotel Collection managing director Hamish Hepburn told Stuff he was delighted for the future of the hotels.

The Godley Hotel Lake Tekapo remains in the ownership of the Mount Cook Collection.

The Heritage Gateway Hotel in Ōmarama with 98 rooms, would trade under the Distinction brand. Countrytime Hotel Ōmārama (48 rooms) would trade under the group's 3-star Discovery brand, Mr Thomson said.

leave having completed 21 years long service and good conduct, so the extra days off helped as well. I'd be lying if I said it's been easy, but what has made it endurable is the amazing support the family and I have received from everyone. It really has helped us all get back to normal.

We have essentially become landlords, running the existing premises, on land owned by the Department of Conservation and vested in the care

The Trust strongly believes there is an urgent need for a replacement Community Health and Wellness Centre to replace the aged, inadequate general practice buildings. Safety, and in particular privacy of access, within a small community is seen as a priority in this concept. We are committed to broadening the scope of the facility and providing a modern purpose-built, future-proofed building that will meet the needs of the general practice and the wider community for many years to come. This in line with Trust's aims:

'The Trust exists to facilitate and enable the ongoing provision of health and wellness in the wider Waitaki Valley Community'. The key role in this mission is to secure the provision of a multipurpose physical environment to cover the breadth of services necessary to promote Health and Wellbeing, and to dispense health care. The medical practice build will be the major, but not only, component, with allied health services, including physiotherapy, counselling, podiatry, ear nurse, district nursing and particularly a community meeting room also being accommodated.'

The Trust is a charitable organisation. As such it is not required to meet commercial imperatives. Inherent in the facilitation of accessible health care is the requirement to keep client cost of access to the minimum whilst also providing for the ongoing upkeep of the planned facility. Collaboration with local lwi – the Moeraki Runaka - is seen as a core and fundamental to this mission.

To be blunt, the existing facility is marginal at best, certainly not fit-for-purpose. It is a collection of old 1960's Catchment Commission buildings. Over time these were joined by a roofing structure and closed in (the current waiting room!). Disability and ambulance access is poor with consulting rooms and offices on different levels. Practice staff struggle with insufficient rooms and space; poor insulation and lack of adequate heating and cooling; constant maintenance issues (leaking roof, blocked drainage etc) which the Trust endeavours to fix in a timely fashion, always at significant cost. The walls are thin and not suitable for the confidentiality required in health care. Major upgrades are needed (more heat pumps, insulation, double glazing). Quite simply the 60-plus year old existing building does not meet the current building codes and is well past its used-by date.

We see this as an overdue, essential service that would supply:

- An attractive siting for the incumbent, and future, general practice staff plus separate rooms for resident and visiting allied health services physiotherapy, podiatry, audiology, District Nurse, secondary care specialists.
- Advanced Emergency facilities including resuscitation, holding and ease of transfer capabilities including; adjacent helipad

- Positioning close to Civil Defence services.
- Kurow-based, as central to the Ahuriri Ward stretching from Duntroon to Ohau and also the Hakataramea Valley; half way between existing centres in Twizel and Oamaru; 1.5hours from Timaru.
- A significant 'combination space' set aside for:
 - 1.A rehab gym for physiotherapy/yoga/pilates
 - 2.Community gatherings/meetings
 - 3. Gathering place for rest and relaxation for elderly.
- Advanced heating/cooling and communication, IT services.
- A double access to allow separate entrances for patients and the public, and for staff.

After a due diligence process, the Trust has identified an ideal site for a replacement facility incorporating the above. This was arrived after identifying four potential sites and analysing the virtues and negatives of each. At this point the input of the wider Ahuriri Ward community is sought to for the Trust proceed with this project.

THEREFORE, we anticipate in the near future:

- Presentation to the Ahuriri Community Board for their interaction with the WDC
- The use of villages gazettes in Duntroon, Kurow, Otematata, Omarama to advertise a series of interactive community meetings in each village so that the community can hear the plans, ask questions, and offer suggestions,

Please watch this space for announcements regarding this process over coming weeks and months.

Finally we are extremely lucky to have the current health personnel in the Gardner practice. We are in consultation with them at each step in the project process.

Ahuriri Community Board

From Ahuriri Community Board member Mike King

- I hope as many of you as possible took the time to complete a submission on the Waitaki District Council proposed draft 'Interim Speed Management Plan', in particular in relation to the proposed changes around Ōmārama School. Consultation on this has closed. The council will hear verbal submissions in May and adopt the plan at its meeting in June.
- just reminder that if you would like to report an issue the best way is to use the council's Snap Send Solve app. The Snap Send Solve app works by identifying the location the photo is taken using your phone's GPS data. It sends an email to the Council from your email address, including the incident type, notes, address of incident, photo, and contact details. The report is then sent to the relevant Council department to resolve. There is an Apple and an Android version of the app. [NB This app may incur internet data charges or may come out of your data package allowance. Requests can still be lodged by filling out an online service request form, emailing service@waitaki.govt.nz, phoning 03 433 0300 or visiting the council office.]

Consultation on annual plan underway

Now is the time to have your say about the proposed increases in rates, fees and charges to be paid to the Waitaki District Council in the 2023/24 year.

The council's proposed annual plan - its budget for next year - is open for consultation now until April 30. In all, the council is forecasting rates to increase an average of 8.06% for the 2023-2024 year. - Copies of the consultation document are at the Library.

The big-ticket item is the building of the Waitaki Events Centre in Oamaru. As well, the council wants to focus is on 'preparing for emergencies', taking on the Maheno water supply, reviewing its policy about when and how it communicates with the community about its plans – the significance and engagement policy – and coastal erosion, particularly its effect on old landfills, plus roading. It also wants to 'unfund' depreciation – that is to not set aside and save the full portion of funds which would be needed to pay for the replacement of some water and property assets because the assets have been revalued and the value has gone up. It says this would mean a savings to the ratepayer 1.8% for 2023-24.

Page 13 of the document says the council expects to receive \$14.8 million in Government 'Better off' funding which it will spend on 'community well being' projects including "Waitaki Placemaking" which is part of its Economic Development Strategy. It says this will mean it can invest in the Ōamaru CBD as well as Palmerston, Ōmārama and Otematata town centres. It asks for any comment about this at the end of the feedback form which is at the end of the document.

The council has given some examples of what the proposed rates increase will mean. It has estimated rates on a residential Ōmārama property of \$390,000 will go up by\$143 from \$2380 to \$2523, or \$6.91 a day from July 1. (see page 15) It has also estimated the effect on average commercial and agricultural properties in the Waitaki, also on page 15.

However, to make sense of how much additional fees and charges – like building and licensing charges - will increase for the next financial year you will need to check the fine print - and it really is fine print. These are listed in a separate document which can be found if you scroll down from the link to the annual plan. The proposed -2023-24-fees-and-charges will come into force on July 1.

In this, on page 10, the council proposes to put up the cost for solid waste disposal by 15.38% or \$20 from \$130 to \$150 per cubic metre because of an increase in contractors' fees in the 2022/23 financial year.

The cost to dispose of green waste will rise from \$60 to \$70 per cubic metre for the same reason. These charges were also increased in the 2022/23 year.

Also on page 10 a new charge for commercial users of the A2O trail of \$5 per day per client is proposed.

In another example, on page 20 the council propose to raise the cost to register a non-working dog by \$17 to \$87 a year.

There are various ways you can have your say and these are detailed on page 18 of the Annual Plan engagement document.

Hearings of the submissions to the annual plan will take place on May 15 and 16, and the final plan will be formally adopted by the council at its meeting of June 27.

A separate consultation on the new Council Controlled Organisation – the Economic Development Agency - opens tomorrow Thursday April 6 and continues until May 7. This new agency would support economic development and incorporate tourism management and promotion.
