I asked a few of you if you would like to write a Christmas letter to your friends and whanau here and let us know a little of what life has been like where you are.

I'm so sorry, it turned out to be a tough ask.

We - should I say, I - have become complacent here, somewhat cocooned in our New Zealand 'bubble', and have forgotten just how difficult it can be.

"Thanks, but I'll pass on this one. I envy you all in NZ. Totally opposite here with Covid and nasty politics."

"Yes, vaccinations have started here but there is a backlog of people to work through (front line health workers then the elderly and clinically vulnerable) before most of us are eligible for it. Then the process is two stage with the two doses a month apart. So there is some way to go yet.

Much of the country is out of lockdown for now though with significant restrictions..

But with the Christmas shopping followed by Xmas itself many of us are expecting there will be another spike of infections followed by a further lockdown in the New Year. I shall try to avoid all the usual activity."

Please know that we care.

This comes to you with our very best wishes for a Merry Christmas, and our New Year resolution to stay close whatever the distance.

And while we will not get to share this special time of year together, I really want to wish all my dear friends and acquaintances whom I have been following on social media, and everyone in the local community, a very merry Christmas and my best wishes for the coming year.

# A Christmas letter home...

# - from Muntagin, Western Australia

As we all know 2020 has been a very weird year...

After returning to Aus in December 2019 after what I thought was a year that couldn't get much worse, who could have guessed what 2020 held in store for us all. As some will know, after having three months in Aus in the 2017 winter, we had set off in May 2018 to spend a couple of years travelling and working in Australia, but tragedy intervened with Murray becoming ill in March 2019 and us returning to NZ, and him passing a few short months later.

It was a tough call to come back to Aus, but Murray had insisted that I carry on with our dream of travelling the entire country, so Lucy (our Jack Russell) and I headed back to Queensland in December to house sit for friends on Bribie Island - an hour north of Brisbane for most of January. I then went further north to Hervey Bay and Bundaberg for look around for a couple of weeks and to fill in some time before another house sit in Burringbar in northern NSW - inland from Byron Bay in the Tweed Valley, which is a very attractive part of the country.

This took me until the end of February and I was about to accept a three to six month position managing a motel in Mt Isa in western Queensland, when I received a call from some very old friends in WA asking me to come over and help with seeding - the planting of their crops. At this time Covid was only just rearing its head, and these guys were having to go to the UK for urgent family business, and as I had done the harvest for them in 2018 and worked for them many years ago I could slot straight into the job. So instead of an 1800 km trip to western Queensland, I set off on the 4500km journey to WA, going via SA and Adelaide to spend a few days with friends, and then up to Lake Bonney on the Murray River with other friends who we had travelled with up thru the centre to Darwin in the winter of 2017.

I still wasn't paying much attention to the Covid situation as I left South Australia for the long drive over the Nullarbor, but in hindsight my timing was fairly tight, as



three days after crossing into WA the border was closed, and it has only just reopened in the last few days. I then spent a few days in Esperance and left there the day before it to went into regional lockdown. As we now know it all happened very quickly, but looking back I don't think I missed any warnings or anything. It all happened so fast it took a lot of people by surprise.

With the national and international border closures my friends were unable to go to the UK but they still wanted me to stay on and with WA being in regional lockdown split into 5 regions and travel forbidden between the regions, I couldn't go anywhere anyway. So I spent my lockdown sitting on a 500hp tractor seeding (drilling) around 2500 ha.

Towards the end of June the border restrictions were starting to ease, and friends from Brisbane suggested that we meet up in Darwin, so after catching up with relations and friends in Perth and a quick trip down to Margaret River, I headed north, retracing our steps from our trip down from Darwin in October 2018. The west coast of WA is spectacular and places like Kalbarri, Carnarvon, Exmouth and Broome are well worth visiting - not to mention the amazing Karijini National Park near Tom Price - a very attractive mining town.

We crossed into the NT a day after the border opened, tho I did have to complete a border pass, and travelled on to Katherine and then into Darwin, to catch up with the guys who had travelled up from Brisbane. This was my fourth time in Darwin - I love the NT and the plan was to spend a few weeks there before moving on to western Queensland, where apart from a couple of brief stops while flying over it, I have not been to.

But Covid reared it's ugly head again with the outbreaks in Melbourne and Sydney and the interstate borders shut again. So a couple of weeks in Darwin turned into six or seven, while I waited to see where and when I could go. The temperatures were starting to warm up, and the humidity increasing, and an early wet season threatening, so I made a reluctant decision to head back to the west, where I had the offer of a job for harvest. Tho' the WA border was 'hard closed' I was able to apply for, and get an exemption to travel across the border as agricultural worker are classified as essential workers. But I did have to have to quarantine in Kununurra for 14 days. So in mid-September I crossed back into WA and went into quarantine in a caravan park and had a Covid test. It was getting very warm by them - 36c to 38C most days and the humidity was building. I had taken advice from an online page and brought a paddling pool, which was a saviour for both Lucy and I.

So here I am ..... in Muntagin about 350 km due east of Perth, driving a header, about two thirds of the way thru 10000ha of crop. It's been a difficult harvest with rain and thunder storms holding us up at the moment, but long days when we're going. It doesn't look as tho' we'll e finished before the 25th so I know what I'll be doing for Christmas .

Where to from here you ask ...... well it's been a tough year for me.... grief catches you out at the most unexpected moments, and I'm sure that if Covid and its border restrictions hadn't been around I would have probably given up and be home by now. I still haven't explored western and inland Queensland, but I plan to be home this year - home to Omarama. It's a great little town that I hold close to me and have some fantastic supportive friends.

It will only be the second time since 1995 that I am not able to spend your summers in Omarama, chasing all the trout and remembering to keep to the left side of the road.




















# School end-of-year assembly 2020

Then disaster struck Ohau and we were overwhelmed by its ferocity. It was beyond





I know all of the attending brigades from around the area did an outstanding job and congratulate them as well.

There was also a couple of Ohau village locals who went above and beyond. I'm hoping that their brave efforts will be recognised appropriately in the new year. I'd also congratulate the Ohau community who evacuated so quickly and effectively. The pre-planning for such an event no doubt saved lives that night.

Those 3 incidents would be the ones that stick in my mind for 2020....hopefully that's it. I'd also like to acknowledge the support that I've received over the last 12 months from within the community. Sometimes policing can be tough, and your messages and support were/are very much appreciated.

Anyhoo that's it from me, Ange, and the kids, wish all of you a safe Xmas, look out for each other and roll on 2021!


